5 Things to Know about the Peace Corps Community in South Carolina

National Peace Corps Association affiliate groups include the Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) of South Carolina.

Through its Paul Coverdell Fellowship program, the Peace Corps has a partnership with the Darla Moore School of Business at the University of South Carolina (USC). USC-Columbia and the University of South Carolina-Upstate also participate in the Peace Corps Prep program, through which students are offered areas of study intended to make them more competitive applicants for Peace Corps service.

The RPCVs of South Carolina have collaborated with various organizations, including Partners of Americas, the World Affairs Council, the Columbia Council for Internationals, and Lutheran Services Carolinas. Volunteer work included collecting furniture and household supplies that are delivered to newly arriving refugee families.

In March 2024, South Carolina Governor Henry McMaster issued a proclamation honoring Peace Corps Week, stating in part that the Peace Corps "remains a persistent global force for good."

Karla Buru, a University of South Carolina graduate who served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Romania (2007-09), is Deputy Director of Health Strategy and External Affairs, and Chief of Staff with the South Carolina Department of Public Health.
